



1. The aesthetic makes it seem like the middle rail will be populated with whatever options is selected, rather than jumping to a new page
 - Importantly, the new page opens in the same tab, not even a new one; the recovery from the user mistaken action is most readily the back button
2. Needs some sort of graphic to more readily show that these are links to the outside/ "meta" library services
3. These services rule; good to see them featured somewhat prominently, but they're still lost in the overall aesthetic. The differentiation in the sections is too muddled to make anything stand out
4. These seem like they could be the main focus of the visual aspects of the page; i.e. the largest visual elements on the page
 - a) very useful, pretty clear about what it is and to where it will take the user. Good placement in existing page structure
 - b) The scrolling (presumably) changing events series should be featured much more prominently. Another element that is lost amongst the page
5. More useful tools. Needs updated aesthetics, and a site redesign would hopefully result in better placement

Wasted Space* - clearly so as to keep the graphic proportions correct, but those proportions seem awfully small for a typical browser window. Additionally, the left side with "LIBRARIES" has a sliver persistent no matter to what size the window is shrunk
